### **Environmental Communications**

I'm interested in pursuing an environmental communications degree at Hendrix by focusing on classes that marry environmental studies and psychology courses, supplemented by some practical communications courses from other universities. The study of communications is central to addressing environmental concerns because it focuses on different areas of human behavior and connection with the environment. Being effective communicator engages with audiences by understanding these things and developing mechanisms to reach those audiences. This is a field that is a major interest of mine. I feel that I will enjoy it and be able to be successful. Taking classes in these fields through Hendrix will develop my knowledge of the human mind, behavior, and society in a way that will prepare me to be effective as a professional communicator.

I believe that the combination of psychology, environmental studies, English, and Communications classes will provide a strong foundation and working knowledge of how human systems not only tie together but how to best develop communication approaches to reach people in effective ways in a professional setting.
